- choose nouns or pronouns appropriately for clarity and cohesion and to avoid repetition

- use fronted adverbials
- learn the grammar terminology for Y3/4
- use commas after fronted adverbials
- indicate possession by using the possessive apostrophe with plural nouns
- use and punctuate direct speech

- In UKS2 pupils should be taught to: recognise vocabulary and structures that are appropriate for formal speech and writing, including subjunctive forms • use passive verbs to affect the presentation of information in a sentence • use the perfect form of verbs to mark relationships of time and cause
- use expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely
- use modal verbs or adverbs to indicate degrees of possibility
